



When esp Savannah launched on January 13, 2025, the small but mighty staff hit the ground running. The Savannah community was ready—and the need was undeniable. In just months, over 100 families have already joined programming!

Serving so many, so quickly, required determination, creativity, and problem-solving on the fly. Executive Director Jennifer Wilkins, with the support of her board and team, successfully launched esp's summer camp in 2025, a year earlier than the original 2026 schedule.

Today, esp Savannah is laying the foundation for the growth ahead, building the infrastructure needed to meet the community's expanding needs. Exciting times are just around the corner in 2026!

Sixteen-year-old Maryn Brown is vibrant, full of life, and loves to sing and dance. But the stroke she suffered in utero left her with global developmental delays and ongoing seizures that require multiple medications. These challenges made it difficult for her to keep up in traditional dance or gymnastics classes, often leaving her without a place where she could truly belong.

When Maryn found esp, everything changed. Her abilities are now celebrated, and any obstacles that might hold her back are removed. Maryn has a new place where she can shine! This year brought new milestones—Maryn attended her very first summer camp, including a full week of overnight camp. It was a huge step for her and a joyful one. The memory she treasures most is riding on the esp float in Savannah's St. Patrick's Day parade, waving and singing as the crowd cheered. She still talks about it every day.

Maryn's story shows esp at its best: a community where every person is seen for who they are, and given space to thrive. It's the support of caring individuals and corporate partners that makes stories like hers possible in Savannah.





# INVESTING IN THE FULL FAMILY

The Drew Swan Sibling Scholarship was created in honor of Andrew "Drew" Swan, beloved brother of esp participant Samantha Swan. Drew's life was marked by quiet strength, service, and deep love for his sibling.

Each year, this one-time \$1,500 award is presented to a sibling of an individual with disabilities in Georgia. Applicants must be accepted or enrolled in a two- or four-year nonprofit higher education institution and go through a competitive process reviewed by an esp committee.

This year's recipient is Hannah Nichols, who plans to study Engineering with the goal of designing more accessible solutions for people with disabilities. Growing up alongside three siblings with disabilities, Hannah credits those relationships with shaping her character.

"Those early lessons in patience, compassion, and responsibility shaped me into a leader who can stay calm under pressure and lead with empathy. These experiences did not make me weaker, they made me wiser," said Hannah.

#### A Legacy of Belonging and Hope

For Jon Williams and Amy Stone, esp isn't just an organization—it's family. Their connection began nearly twenty years ago with a simple introduction: a babysitter who volunteered at esp. When Jon was asked to cook BBQ for an esp event, he didn't hesitate. That one act of service became the start of a lifelong relationship built on generosity, inclusion, and love.

Inclusion runs deep in Jon's story. Growing up in South Georgia, he often witnessed his father, Jay, welcome individuals of all abilities into their family owned grocery store—a rare act of belonging in the 1980s. His dad would even check him out of school to volunteer at the Special Olympics, teaching him that everyone deserves to be seen and celebrated. That example, and the family mantra of 'leave it better than you found it,' continues to guide how Jon and Amy raise their own children—JD, Bay, Garrett, and Amelia—and why they choose to give back today.

Over the years, Jon has helped shepherd esp's growth from a small, parent-led program into a thriving, statewide organization. Among his proudest moments is helping bring the Watkinsville campus to life—and now helping bring esp's overnight Camp Hooray in Jackson County to life—a place where families experience the joy of true belonging.

This year, Jon and Amy deepened their legacy through the creation of The Windmill Fund, esp's first endowed Emergency Family Support Fund. The fund provides direct financial assistance to families in crisis, helping them weather the unexpected challenges of raising a child with disabilities.

The name draws inspiration from the poem "Welcome to Holland," which describes the unexpected beauty of raising a child with disabilities. Like the windmill—strong, steadfast, and full of grace—the fund will stand as a source of hope and stability for families when life takes an unplanned turn.

"It's generational change," Jon says. "esp changes how the next generation will view individuals with disabilities—through kindness, awareness, and inclusion." Through their vision, Jon and Amy are ensuring that change endures for generations to come.






